

Worship this week...

Our focus in worship for this half term is 'Inquire'. We will be asking ourselves some big questions. Mrs Pepin began our focus on Tuesday with 'How can we be successful?' She asked us to really focus on one of our Secrets of Success each week, and one child in each class will spot others who have been using that secret of success well and share their findings with their class teacher.

On Wednesday, Reverend Jonathan asked 'What is Lent?' and shared how Christians use this time to prepare and think about the events of Easter. Often Christian people give something up and try to pray more during this time. He explained that Lent starts with Shrove Tuesday and organised a pancake tossing competition between Mr Cullinane and Mrs Power. They flipped the pancake really quickly and didn't drop it too many times!









On Thursday our Picture News team were back in action and thinking about how important packaging is. The idea is designed to make recycling easier, along with using material that is able to be recycled more than once. Sprite bottles will also become clear rather than green. Laser-engraved product and nutritional information will be featured on the back of the bottle. How easy will it be to read though?



What is Easter all about?

Emma from iSing Pop visited school on Monday to share an Easter workshop with us. She taught us two new songs and helped us to think about why Easter is so important to Christian people. We thought about words linked to Lent, and had a go at rolling different objects – the stone was not great at rolling, yet it rolled away from the entrance to Jesus' tomb.

The singing and dancing was great fun and the whole school joined together at the end of the day to sing together. The children sang 'Only Love' and 'Thank you' so well, and Reverend Jonathan was keen for us to sing them in the Easter Service at the end of term.



















Discovering skills needed to build a house...

The children in Reception have been reading the traditional tale 'The Three Little Pigs'. They have been discovering the skills the three little pigs would have needed to have been able to build a house. Their creativity has been fabulous as they have thought about how bricks are most stable, how crates stack best, how to carry heavy loads carefully, along with drilling, painting and many other skills they need for house building.



















Designing different styles of houses

As well as building outside, the children in Reception have been thinking hard about different house designs with the Lego and Duplo inside too.

They were able to talk about all of the different features of their houses and why they had

included them in their designs. Some of them worked on their own, while others worked with their class mates. They have really enjoyed thinking about the structures and designs and encouraged each other by admiring each others' work.





















'What does a 'place of worship' look like?

In Year 1, the children have begun to think about what a place of worship might look like. They considered pictures of different buildings and started to think about the features of a place of worship. They could talk about buildings that looked 'special' and that these might be places of worship. It will be interesting to see if there are similarities and differences between different places of worship as their learning continues... What are the special features of mosques, temples, churches, synagogues, gurdwaras or mandirs?









Discovering how to make pictures move

Year 2 have been following instructions carefully to discover how to make linkages in their Design Technology work. They used split pins to create fixed and moving pivots, making a snake and a jack-in-the-box come to life and move on the page. They concentrated really hard and were really proud of their successful work.

Inquire ?

How much force does it take to move something?

Year 3 have been investigating how to use force meters to measure how many Newtons are needed to move objects in the classrooms. Firstly, they learned how to use the force meters and how to read them carefully. They then used them to measure how much force was needed to pull a table, a chair, the book box and other objects around the classroom. They showed that they could read the scales really well to compare how much force was needed for different everyday jobs in

the classroom.

It was good working in pairs so that one while one person was pulling the object, the other person could read the scale.










How can we change the pitch of a sound?

This week, Year 4 have been making their own musical instruments and investigating how to change the pitch of the sound. They used elastic bands around plastic tubs. When they plucked the bands the vibrations created a sound. As they added a brick underneath the elastic bands on the back of the instrument, the elastic band became tighter which changed the pitch of the sound. They also investigated how adding more rice to a plastic bottle changed the pitch of the sound it made when it was shaken. Can you predict how the sounds changed? Ask them to see if you were right...













Sharing information about farming

Year 5 have been continuing their learning about 'Sow, Grow and Farm' and have learned how soil fertility, drainage and climate influence the placement and success of agricultural land. They used Jersey as a case study learning about the farming of Jersey Royal potatoes. They created nonchronological reports to share their learning.

Jersey Royals

Jersey Royals are small, tasty potatoes that only grow on the island of Jersey in the Channel Islands. The climate, soil and landscape on Jersey make it the perfect place for growing these historic potatoes.

Climate

Jersey has a mild climate, right amount of sunlight and freedraining soil.



Soil

Local seaweed called 'vraic' is still used as a natural fertilizer to give the soil extra nutrients.



History

The people of Jersey had been eating potatoes for 100 years, but one day in 1878 a man called Hugh de la Haye, changed history by visiting the village shop. The story goes that Hugh saw two of the biggest potatoes he had ever seen. He bought them and took them home. One of the potatoes had 15 eyes from where other potato plants grow. Later that evening, Hugh and his friends decided to cut the potato into 15 pieces. The they each took their potato plant home and planted it in a field which over-looked the sea just to see what would happen. The next spring, all the potatoes were harvested and were small, round, healthy and delicious. The most delicious potatoes, however, were tiny and kidney-shaped and came from one single plant.

Landscape

Jersey is on southern-facing slopes, called cotils, which faces towards the beaches of Normandy in France.



Growing and harvesting

The planting season continues until April. They take 12 weeks to produce. To make sure they're as good as they can be, they're dug from the fields, washed, packed and shipped to the mainland and distributed to shops and supermarkets all over Britain. Throughout the season, 1500 tons of Jersey Royals are shipped overseas every day

Problem


Freak weather conditions, such as too much rain or hard frosts, can lower the quantity and quality of the potato crop.



Learning how to look after our mental health

In Year 6, the children have discussed what the term 'mental health' means to them and thought about signs of 'mental health' and 'mental ill-health'. They used a balloon analogy to help them think about how their minds can become overwhelmed when doing certain things. (A balloon was blown up a little bit each time they thought of something that might be playing on their minds). They discussed ways to deal with pressures so that they don't feel like they might 'explode'. The children thought of some excellent strategies to use to avoid becoming too overwhelmed. (The balloon was deflated a little with each

suggestion).



What helps you to empty your balloon and relieve pressures?




The Year 6 children have also been writing poetry, and Bella and Fifi came to share their wonderful personification of fire with me. I could imagine this figure walking destructively through a forest.

CRACKLING LIFE!








World Book Day Menu:
