Measuring ingredients to bake bear biscuits



Year 2 have been learning about imperative verbs this week, and have found that it is essential to use the most effective imperative verb to make the instructions clear to the reader. They had great fun acting out an imperative verb for the rest of the class to guess.

Year 3 have been putting their scientific skills to work measuring how many newtons it took to move a boot on different surfaces. They had practised reading the scales carefully in previous lessons and this week conducted an experiment to see how different surfaces had different levels of friction. They were careful to make sure they used the same boot on each surface. Which surface do you think had the highest friction?

Year 5 have been combining movements, balances, rolls and jumps to create sequences that require them to support each other and work extremely well as a team. As some children rolled across the mats, their class mates performed a forward roll over them. They designed, rehearsed and performed their routines with confidence and skill.

The raffle ticket totals are growing at an alarming rate, with so many children living out our IDEALS in school.






Secrets of Success Champions
